1. Mission Statement

- Project Solace consists of an array of services and missions, but essentially Project Solace is the very definition of the word *Solace*. Solace, as a noun, is defined as comfort or consolation in a time of distress or sadness, and, as a verb, to give comfort or consolation to. Simply put, Project Solace exists to create a space of creativity, healing, and community. With the multitude of purposes it serves, wherever Project Solace travels, physically and emotionally, it serves as a safe place where people can feel at home, and be reminded of their worth.

2. The Name

- As a person who has been through his share of unfortunate events, I know what it is like to be in those times of distress and sadness, at a very intense level at that. During one of those times, I remember my mom was working as a hospice nurse, for a company named Solace. The word just struck me for some reason, I'm not sure why. I viewed my personal journey of focusing on my career and life mission as a "project". It also may have been listening to a lot of Kodak at the time, specifically Project Baby 2, that influenced this. Whenever I was contemplating on the name for my business before I bought my LLC, I knew I wanted the first word to be project, but I couldn't seem to come up with the second word. At that moment, Solace came back to me, and I knew then.
- Project Solace to me symbolizes my relatability and knowledge of depressive times, and my genuine, constant effort to offer solace to anyone that I can, even people who are not necessarily in rougher times.
- We provide "solace" in every way we can. Whether it is a haircut, a talk episode, a community event, and so on.

3. Purpose

- Project Solace serves to solve many problems. A few of our focuses include literacy rates, reducing gun violence/victims rates, providing and nourishing rough neighborhoods, reducing suicide and mental health rates, and repairing broken communities are just a few to name. The main intent of Project Solace in the community

aspect is to just make the most positive impact possible. But, there is a way I can relate this to a personal level. All of my life, I have been judged and faced discrimination simply because of the way I looked. My predecessors did monumental things to accomplish civil rights for people like me. I am aware and content with knowing I can never amount to that. But I have always thought, "What can I do?" The little things really do matter. I remind myself to always do my good deeds, stay positive, always smile. This fostered into something deeper, more purposeful, what I want my career and legacy to be. If I execute these, for lack of better words, creative ideas alongside spreading positivity and growth, while truly remaining genuine, that could really do something. It could change the way people around my community view my people while setting a great example for not just my community, but everyone. This is even more personal but it is part of the reason I made the "frisky" decision of getting a face tattoo. I tell people sarcastically a big reason is well, because you can't tell me what to do. Though not to get confused, that is very true, and one of my reasons, but on a deeper level it symbolizes one of the most cliche, popular idioms of all time: don't judge a book by its cover. I don't do self praising, so humbly speaking, I am one of the most genuine, caring people you will ever meet. I'm very intelligent, both emotionally and academically, positive, confident, and cultured. I am a pretty good person. However, according to society standards you wouldn't really expect that out of an African American, tattooed, dreadheaded young man. So I feel while providing solace, I can genuinely change the stigma and view around that kind of stereotype, at least in the community in my proximity. It also helped get over my fear of being scared to do things I want to do. I meant this as in positive/neutral things of course. I've always overthought how people would see or judge me. "Should I post this video?" "Maybe they'll say no to my proposition?" "Should I explore this to include in my career?" Doing something like getting my face tattooed was like a peak of "Okay, I can do anything if I did that."

- Eluding back to something I mentioned, I think there is a lack of genuineness in the world at times. Specifically we idolize celebrities, often forgetting they are normal people just like us. Being that they are just like us, they are mean, racist, pedophiles, all the negative, repulsive things we see in our local world. It often surprises me how surprised some people are when another celebrity gets exposed for things of this nature. We will show immense amounts of support for these celebrities but seem to be reluctant to show an ounce of this support to our peers and family. This being said, I pride myself on executing all my good in positivity, and my advancement in career in the most intentional, genuine way I can. It isn't the goal, but if I ever happen to find myself in a high position of wealth or status, I would be able to say I achieved it the right way. I can say the same for the friends and family I dream to bring along with me. So when people interact with Project Solace, I want them to feel that genuineness. Admittedly, I want it to amaze them, and inspire them to emulate the same, in hopes they will inspire someone

else. Just maybe, a miraculous butterfly effect can occur...

It is quite literally the perfect trifecta to forming my Ikigai(a Japanese concept and word meaning "reason for being").
